

Across a packed day of racing, cheering and record-breaking, our swimmers clocked up an impressive haul: seven golds, eight silvers, four bronzes and seven ribbons. But beyond the medals, what stood out was the unmistakable DESS energy; calm focus on the blocks, bursts of encouragement from the sidelines and the kind of sportsmanship that can't be coached.

### Stars in the Swim Lane

Among the standout moments:

## **A Term of Creative** Adventures From Magical Doors to Urban **Murals**

This term, Year 1 and Year 6 stepped out of the classroom and into the world of creativity, with two very different but equally inspiring art experiences that stretched imaginations and brought learning to life in vivid colour.

### Year 1 at Jam Jar – Where Imagination Finds a Doorway

For Year 1, the fairytale world took a wonderfully handson twist during a visit to Jam Jar, one of Dubai's most beloved creative spaces. Building on their class work around traditional tales, the children designed and decorated their own magical doors, each one opening up into a universe of make-believe.



The workshop encouraged storytelling, experimentation, and individual expression while also giving the children a chance to try out new materials and techniques. From

glittering doorknobs to swirling patterns, every creation was as unique as the artist behind it. The sense of pride (and a little sparkle) travelled all the way back to school.

### Year 6 at Graffiti Dubai – Spray Paint, Stencils, and Serious Style



Meanwhile, our Year 6 artists turned up the volume on creativity at Graffiti Dubai, trading watercolours for spray cans and goggles. With the support of professional street artists, they learned how to use stencils, colour fades, and tagging techniques to create their own vibrant pieces - first on massive practice walls, then on individual canvases to take home.

The results were bold, expressive, and packed with personality. Back at school, the

excitement hasn't stopped. Hallway conversations are buzzing with aerosol art tips, and if the requests for more cans and canvas are anything to go by, this won't be the last time Year 6 goes full Banksy!

## **Microclimates, Minibeasts** and Mosaics **Our Cyprus Residential**

In mid March, twelve intrepid Year 5 and 6 pupils set off on an unforgettable residential adventure to the amazing island of Cyprus. And what a week it was!

There was a real buzz in the air as we gathered at the airport early that first morning; twelve wide-eved adventurers and two equally excited teachers, ready for the journey ahead. The spirit of exploration was alive from the very start.

After a long journey, we arrived at our base in Kritou Terra. Supported by expert local instructors, the children were soon immersed in a jam-packed programme of outdoor learning, ancient history and friendshipbuilding.







Throughout the week, children took part in hands-on invertebrate studies - both on land and in water - gaining brilliant insights into the fascinating minibeasts of the island. Orienteering and hiking challenged our navigational skills and introduced us to the unique geology, flora and fauna of Cyprus. We even learned about the island's iconic sea turtles, whose lifecycle we explored in depth.

In true DESS spirit, the children (and Miss Wright) showed incredible courage and resilience during the rock climbing and abseiling activities, pushing themselves outside their comfort zones and cheering one another on every step of the way. By the end of the day, we were proud of our achievements, tired, and ready for a well-earned evening meal.

One of the highlights of the week was our visit to Paphos harbour, where the children stepped back in time to explore stunning Roman mosaics and the ruins of ancient civilisations, topped off with a spot of souvenir shopping for our families.

Before heading to the airport on our final day, we squeezed in one last surprise; ten-pin bowling. Spirits were high as pupils took on the teachers in a lively staff versus students showdown. There was plenty of laughter, a bit of healthy competition, and a fittingly fun end to a week full of adventure.

Of course, it wasn't all science, geography and history - there was plenty of time for sunshine, team games and the occasional ice cream (or two), with much debate about the best flavour combinations. The glorious weather made every outdoor moment even more memorable, and evenings were spent



sharing stories, playing games, and enjoying delicious food together.

One of the most special parts of the trip was seeing the children form new friendships, often with peers they do not usually spend time with. They also rose to the challenge of living independently, taking responsibility for their accommodation and daily routines, and showing real maturity and resilience.

We returned with muddy shoes, full hearts and a treasure trove of memories. A huge well done to our incredible children - you made us proud every single day.



## **Top of the Class** DESS Earns Global Recognition in TIMSS 2023

It's official: we're once again leading the way in global learning! The results from the 2023 Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS) are in, and our Year 5 pupils have placed firmly within the advanced benchmark.

Grade 4 Mathematics	633	Advanced Benchmarking
Grade 4 Science	629	Advanced Benchmarking

Considered one of the world's most respected assessments of maths and science learning, TIMSS puts childrens' skills to the test on an international stage. This year's results not only reflected our childrens' academic strength but also earned us two certificates of excellence at a special awards ceremony held at the Museum of the Future.

### Two Awards, One Outstanding Community

Our first award recognised us as one of Dubai's top 10 schools for highachieving Emirati children in TIMSS 2023; a proud marker of our inclusive, high-expectation ethos. The second honoured us as one of the Emirate's top 20 high-performing schools overall.



These accolades celebrate more than just numbers. They speak to the daily effort and engagement of our children, the expertise and dedication

of our teachers, and the culture of curiosity that drives learning across our classrooms.

### **Curious Minds, Confident Learners**

The results remind us that at DESS Primary Oud Metha, science and maths aren't just about formulas and facts. They're about thinking deeply, asking questions, and making connections. Whether it's hands-on experiments or tackling real-world problems, our learners are encouraged to see themselves as explorers and problem-solvers.

The 6Cs; our guiding values, play no small part. From critical thinking to collaboration, they shape the way children approach every subject, helping them grow into not just strong children, but thoughtful citizens.

## Changing, Adapting, Discovering Science Sparks at DESS



British Science Week at DESS Primary Oud Metha brought classrooms and corridors to life with questions, experiments and a healthy dose of scientific wonder. With this year's theme of Changing and Adapting, children explored how living things, environments and technologies evolve to meet the needs of a shifting world.

From FSI to Year 6, curiosity took centre stage. Break times transformed into hands-on science stations, where children investigated animal adaptations, camouflage techniques, and even tracked human growth across age groups. Helping lead the way were our brilliant Year 6 Science Leaders, who guided younger children with clarity, care and a contagious excitement for all things science.

### **Slime, Static and Big Reactions**

Throughout the week, every day brought new opportunities to experiment. Gooey slime-making introduced chemical reactions. Pressure canisters exploded into motion. Electricity challenges tested nerves and problem-solving skills. Across every year group, there was a shared buzz of discovery as children proudly showcased their learning and inspired one another with questions and observations.

### Science Career Day: Real Scientists, Real Impact

We kicked off the term with Science Career Day; a school-wide celebration of science in the real world. The goal? To show that scientists aren't just in lab coats, but in kitchens, construction

and even crime scenes. From paleontologists to drone pilots, the day invited children to see science as a part of everyday life, and imagine where it might take them.



Our youngest learners dug for fossils with wide-eyed enthusiasm and met a larger-than-life visitor from the Jurassic era. In FS2, volcanic eruptions stole the show in a dramatic hands-on experiment. Year 1 children ran an ice-cream parlour as food chemists, while Year 2 cosmetic scientists created their own bath bombs, mixing scents and textures with impressive precision. Key Stage 2 took things up a gear. F1 engineers tested race cars built for speed. Forensic scientists solved a mystery with real evidence and sharp deduction skills. Invisible ink revealed secret messages, and our drone-flying search-and-rescue teams completed airborne missions with focus and flair.

A special highlight came from a visiting Molecular Biologist, who spoke to the children about her work studying DNA and developing treatments for rare diseases, offering a powerful glimpse into science with real-world impact.



### Wonder, Confidence and the Curiosity to Keep Asking

British Science Week and Science Career Day are just part of our wider commitment to embedding science across the curriculum. These moments matter - not just because of what's learned, but because of what they ignite: curiosity, confidence and the courage to explore the unknown.

Whether mixing potions, cracking codes or flying drones, our children are learning to think like scientists - and they're only just getting started. So, watch this space!
